




American warplanes disturbed my slumber last night out here in the Indian Ocean. The US is getting ready to bomb, bomb, bomb Iran... again. But I thought the vaunted US Air Force already took care of business? In June after the US bombed Iran, Sean Hannity reported "I just spoke to the President of the United States. 

"Bomb, Bomb, Bomb Vietnam," was their advice. They grandly named the US bombing of Vietnam "Rolling Thunder." But it was a dud. Bob barked at Walt when they realized that the more they bombed, the more Vietnam's military strength grew:

"The plan isn't working. The bombing you promised would work has not moved the dial one bit—it has not done what you said it would do. Hanoi is no closer to the negotiating table than they were in 1965, when Rolling Thunder began. This goddamned bombing campaign, it's been worth nothing, it's done nothing. We have dropped more bombs than in all of Europe in all of World War II and it hasn't done a fucking thing."







But how can so many highly educated Washington geniuses get US bombing so wrong for so long? Back then and today? *FLYBOYS* traces the origin of America's Victory Disease. Until 1945, all wars had ended in the mud. For example, the US had to invade Germany before the Reich surrendered. But for the first time in human history, a country – Japan—surrendered without being invaded. America bombed Japan to smithereens, and many assumed it was airpower which defeated Japan. 


Hollywood propaganda reinforced the U.S. Air Force's Victory Disease in the 1950's.






